INTERIM MODERATOR'S MESSAGE

For over twelve months the Ministry Settlement Board, working closely with Session, has conducted a Parish review to determine the future ministry needs of St Columba.

We have agreed that the future needs of the Congregation will be best served by someone who can bring a younger/family focus without sacrificing the rich culture of traditional worship for which St Columba is known and valued.

The Kaimai Presbytery has also instructed us to look for a minister who can bring to the role 'missional gifts and experience.'

Consequently, we believe that God has given us an opportunity to invest in the ministry development of Alec Wallis, a young man, who although not an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church has had significant parish and other mission experience.

Alec has completed his theological training and plans to apply to become an Intern in the National Ordination Ministry Programme. Our expectation is that, if accepted, Alec will be able to do his training in St Columba. As a ministry intern Alec will be employed on a 70% basis which will also mean a reduced financial cost to the Parish. Internships are for two years but could be less in Alec's case because of his significant ministry experience.

As a graduate intern, Alec will then be available to accept a call to be St Columba's next Minister if this remains the MSB's and Session's recommendation to the Congregation.

The process of student selection will take some time and so Session has offered, with Presbytery's support, a one year 'lay ministry supply' contract,' beginning on 1st July.

I will remain as the Interim Moderator until the vacancy is filled. The shortfall in any ministry needs, during the internship stage, will be made up in other ways as they are now.

This way forward has the full support of Session, the Kaimai Presbytery, and the Interim Moderator. There is a sense of expectation that the Congregation has an opportunity to invest in the ministry training of a young man who also has a lot to give. Alec is by no means going to meet every need and everyone's expectation, which can be said of anyone of us. St Columba has been well served by some very capable senior ministers of the Church. It is unrealistic to expect Alec to bring the same level of maturity and experience to this role.

I'm reminded of the motivating power of encouragement. One of the most motivating things in life is to have

another person say to us - "I believe in you." Jesus was able to go through the three years of his public ministry because he knew that he had his Father's approval. See Mark 1: 9-11.

Session's prayer is that we, the Congregation, will all enthusiastically get behind Alec, embrace the vision and share in the future ministry and mission of St Columba to the glory of God.

I had served as a pastor in different churches in NZ and Australia before meeting Amy in her home country of the Philippines.

Our hope is to serve St Columba with our combined giftings and experiences so that people can be both encouraged and supported in their walk with Christ."

TESTIMONY FROM ALAN SMITH

In England in 1958 I graduated from Marine College as Marine Radio Officer. At that time, unbeknown to me, in N.Z. a 14 year old girl was daily catching a rural school bus from her parents farm into Te Awamutu to attend College. On the bus she would read and memorise scripture verses put out by the NAVIGATORS. She didn't know it, but God was preparing her to meet a young Englishman so she would be ready to witness to him.

This is how events unfolded.

I commenced my sea-going career in 1958 and even though I liked the life and the occupation there was something missing. I felt that there had to be something better in life.

I subsequently emigrated to N.Z in 1962 at the age of 22, to work for the Union Steam Ship Company as a Radio Officer, having served the previous 3 years in the British Merchant Navy.

I knew no-one in N.Z. It was all a bit of an adventure.

When I arrived in Auckland in June of 1962 things were pretty primitive and the best a restaurant could offer, was meat and 3 veg. - not a Chinese restaurant in town; and the 6 o'clock swill was a revelation!

The ships I served on were plying around the coast, others were Trans-Tasman and Pacific Island traders.

In port as a single man, I found myself in the company of ship's officers going off to a pub and then looking for a meal and a movie before wending our way back to the ship. It got monotonous after a while but there were quite a few lighter moments.

Early in 1964 I had just commenced a long leave period in Auckland when I met two colleagues who, like me, were on leave and were planning a South Island tour. I managed to convince them that I couldn't possibly be left out and a three-some would reduce the cost of the petrol.

When we crossed over to Picton we headed for a Nelson camping-ground where we were to rendezvous with friends of the car-owner.

Unbeknown to us they had picked up two young female hitch-hikers at Picton and brought them to Nelson. So it came to pass that we met up with them and, quickly assessing the situation, asked them out to dinner and a movie....as boys do!

After preliminaries I managed to separate one of them and during the course of conversation she witnessed to me of the saving power of the Lord Jesus Christ.

I had no Christian upbringing and had never heard the gospel. I was taken by her sincerity and readiness to answer questions with more scripture verses (little knowing that she had completed the Navigators course of memorising scripture).

The girl in question is my wife Joy!

We exchanged addresses and I wrote some months later (no mobile phones) and arranged to meet next time my ship was in Tauranga. She traveled over from her home in the Waikato and stayed with her relatives. I had the opportunity to meet a lot of likeminded people and went to church with them on the Sunday morning for the first time ever. My last time in a church was as best man at my brother's wedding in 1959!

I saw in this group of people something that I wanted. My thoughts went back to my reason for leaving the U.K. - I had wanted something better in life!!!!!

We sailed from Tauranga for Sydney and on the Saturday in port with no wharf work I went ashore with a few officers to hear a jazz group at a hotel, had a meal and we got back to the ship about 11pm. As I was dropping off to sleep, I was jolted awake with a blow over my heart. This was followed by two more and between the first and the last, I lived my whole life over as in a video clip from my earliest recollections to the present.

In his book "The Last Enemy", Richard Hillary, a Spitfire Pilot in the Battle of Britain wrote: "It is said that a dying man relives his whole life in one rapid kaleidoscope."

The last thing I could do was sleep. I woke up the Purser and told him of the event. Next morning I went ashore to the hospital and had a thorough check-up. I was informed that there was no heart disease, heart and lungs were within normal limits with no noticeable problems.

This was fine but I found it very difficult to drop off to sleep thereafter and I had to sail to Auckland via Suva/Lautoka/Apia and Nuku'alofa! I had to wrestle with the question that if I dropped off to sleep...... would it be my last?

Back in Tauranga, I again met up with Joy and her Uncle witnessed to me and gave me a copy of Robert Laidlaw's tract, "The Reason Why". When I sailed from Tauranga, I put the tract on top of my cabin desk.

On the second night at sea we were in mid-Tasman; I came off watch at 10pm and turned in. On my desk I noticed "The Reason Why" tract and lying in bed, I read it through. When I got to page 30, I read a verse that arrested me...... Laidlaw presented it this way:

'God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son' to be "made sin" for us, "that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16)

When I read that, it impacted me. I felt a welling force rise up through my body as if I had inhaled and stretched at the same time. Paul wrote: 'faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.' Rom 10:17.

Looking back, to that night on the Tasman Sea, I am drawn to the words in *Genesis 1v2;* "...... and darkness was on the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters."

I was ignorant of the fact that Joy, her relatives and many friends had been praying for my conversion for some time. When I gave my testimony in Australia some time later, I was given a verse of confirmation. Another 3:16 reference: This time - *Malachi 3:16*.

"Then those who feared the Lord spoke to one another, And the Lord listened and heard them; So a book of remembrance was written before him for those who fear the Lord and who meditate on His name."

My experience of re-calling my life like a rapid kaleidoscope was

The 'Book of Remembrance' written before me that night on the Tasman Sea.

That was over 50 years ago and He has promised never to leave me nor forsake me. (Heb. 13:5)

My wife planted the seed, her Uncle watered, but God gave the increase.

He is still hovering over me!

NEW ZEALAND'S OLDEST CHURCH

Christ Church (Russell) is the oldest existing church in NZ today, and possibly the oldest building still used for its original purpose. Its beginnings go back to the earliest years of Maori European contact in the Bay of Islands when missionaries from across the harbour at the Paihia mission station rowed across to take services in private homes. Russell, then known by its original Maori name of 'Kororareka' was a rough seaport, popular with Pacific whalers, with the nickname 'The Hellhole of the Pacific.'

The missionaries purchased land in 1834 from Kororareka chiefs Rewa, Wharerahi and Moka and agreed that Maori and Pakeha (Europeans) should have equal rights of burial.

The fundraising subscription list for the church survives with names of missionaries, settlers, traders and ships' captains including 'Captain Fitzroy, Mr. Charles Darwin and officers of HMS Beagle.' The building began in 1835 and a simple rectangular chapel with hipped roof was constructed.

According to official records, the first service was on 3 January 1836 when William Williams from Paihia mentions taking one in the 'new chapel'. Services were conducted in both English and Maori languages. Dr Broughton consecrated the burialground around the church in 1839.

On 30 January 1840 Captain William Hobson used the church to make three proclamations. The first was to announce the extension of the boundaries of New South Wales to include the islands of New Zealand. The second was in relation to his own appointment as Lieutenant Governor of NZ, with the third relating to land transactions (and notably the issue of preemption). A document recording what had occurred was drafted and signed by 41 witnesses, including a number of settlers, missionaries, and the chief Moka Te Kainga-Mataa (being the sole Maori signatory). Following this event, all other occurrences in relation to the Treaty of Waitangi, including the meeting and its signing, occurred across the bay at Waitangi on 5 and 6 February. The church was also used occasionally as a courthouse.

Reverend Robert Burrows was the first resident clergyman living in a vicarage on the hillside above the church. On 11 March 1845, during the Battle of Kororareka between British forces and Maori dissatisfied with British rule, the church was hit by stray musket and cannon balls. Evidence still is visible today.

In 1871 the church was altered to its present shape with V roof, buttresses, a gallery, porch and belfry, and two years later received its name.

By the early 20th Century the church was in a shaky condition so props were set up each side to support it for a time. It was served by vicars based at Kawakawa and from 1953 onwards, Kerikeri.

The church celebrated its centennial in 1936 with an outdoor service, and in 1963 welcomed Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip. In 1986 the church marked its 150th birthday in the presence of the then Governor General, Sir Paul Reeves, and Prime Minister David Lange. In 2000 Christ Church was extensively restored and today continues to draw a constant stream of visitors who enjoy its sense of history, its tranquility and its wairua (spiritual atmosphere.)

Among the graves in the churchyard are those of Tamati Waka Nene (a Ngapuhi chief largely responsible for the Maori's acceptance of the Treaty of Waitangi and who fought for the settlers against Hone Heke,) Hannah King Letheridge (now known to be the second European girl to be born in NZ.) Dr Samuel Ford (the country's first resident surgeon,) members of the Clendon family (James R Clendon was the first honorary United States Consul,) the men from HMS Hazard who fell in the battle, and a number of whalers whose headstones often tell of untimely deaths.

People from all countries find a walk around the churchyard fascinating, as they see links with their past.

The congregation recognises they have a significant ministry to tourists, and welcome people from all over the world to services.



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BACK IN THE DAY...

Over 80 years ago, in Greece sixty thousand Jews lived peacefully in Thessaloniki. It was a valued and vibrant community.

Most of these Jews worked in the port, to the point the port was even closed on Saturday or Shabbat, the Jewish day when religion forbids working. Great emeritus rabbis also lived and studied there. Everyone hung out and liked each other.

But on September 2, 1939, with the outbreak of World War II, this peaceful community would one day feel the terror of the Nazis. On April 6, 1941 Hitler invaded Greece in order to secure his southern front before launching the famous Operation Barbarossa and his great offensive against Russia. Of the 60,000 Jews in Thessaloniki, around 50,000 were exterminated at the Birkenau concentration camp. The massacre of the Jews of Greece was brief but intense. Very few escaped. Among the survivors there was a family known as Bourla.

And after the war, in 1961, a son was born into this miraculous family in the camps. His parents called him Israel - Abraham. He grew up and studied veterinary medicine in Greece. A brilliant student, Abraham got his doctorate in reproductive biotechnology at the veterinary school of Aristotle University in Salonika.

At the age of 34, he decided to move to the United States. He changed his first name Abraham to Albert and met a Jewish woman named Miriam who then became his wife. Together they had two children.

In the United States, Albert was integrated into the medical industry. He progressed very quickly and joined a pharmaceutical company where he became "Head manager". From there, the road was short for little Abraham (Albert) to rise through the ranks to become Chief Operation Officer before obtaining his appointment as CEO of the company in 2019. Throughout 2020 Albert decided to direct all the efforts of the company to try to find a vaccine against a new virus which had just struck the world. He expended great financial and technological efforts to achieve his goal.

A year later his work paid off and the WHO (World Health Organization) and US government authorized his company to produce the long-awaited vaccine ...

Today this vaccine will be distributed in several countries including Germany, which counted thousands of deaths due to the pandemic. Ironically, this vaccine which will save the lives of millions of people around the world including many Germans, was led by a little Jew from Thessaloniki, son of Holocaust survivors. Most of his people were exterminated by Nazi Germany.

And that is why Israel became the first country to receive the vaccine.

In memory of his grandparents and his parents who gave birth to Israel-Abraham Bourla known today as Albert Bourla: CEO of Pfizer! 2
